



#### Julie Savers and Other Plastic Tricks--Part II by George White, PVAS

protecting fish who lose fights. One of the fascinating,
yet irritating characteristics of cichlids is their political
behavior--they grab territory faster than a greedy politician.
In nature this practice enables the strongest and brightest of
the males to control the best feeding and breeding areas,
promoting the survival of the fitest. (sounds nice in theory).

Unfortunately, such behaviorial patterns often have deadly consequences in the confines of an aquarium. An aquarium prevents the loser in a territorial struggle from signaling that the fight is over by using body language, i.e. by removing his or her body from the war zone. Brichard and a number of the experts who have observed cichlids in Lake Malawi and Lake Tanganyika report a notable lack of the deadly aggression often commonplace in aquaria.

The fight over territory in a tank will sometimes continue to the bloody end as long as the loser remains in the sight of the victor. One way to halt the internecine warfare is, as every good cichlid breeder knows, to pack the aquarium with stacks of rocks and other materials to create ample hiding places. An interesting and highly effective variation on this is to cut some three inch square plastic raingutter downspout into pieces six to eight inch long and attach them to the back of the aquarium just below the surface of the water. Synthetic yarn can be strung through them and then taped to the back of the aquarium or tied to the rear legs of an aquarium stand.

These hiding places of last resort offer several advantages over hiding places on the bottom of the tank. Aggressor fish usually patrol only the substrate of the tank when seeking out rivals to eliminate, seldom thinking to look up. In addition, you can fit a large net over the six to eight inch pieces of downspout and net out the injured losers without the chaotic chase that usually ensues when you lift up the rocks or hiding places on the bottom of the aquarium. This method of protecting losing fish works especially well with Lake Tanganyika substrate spawning cichlids like Julies or Lamprologus species that pair up quickly.

Breeding traps. The raingutter downspout can also be used to construct breeding traps for egglayers. First cut a piece slightly shorted than the endside depth of the sides of the breeding aquarium. Then slice it in two lengthwise. Next cut a rectangular piece of plastic "eggcrate grid" (which comes in two by four foot sections to be used with ceiling fluorescent light fixtures) to fit over the bottom of the breeding aquarium. Next cut a piece of 1/8 inch grid plastic screen (used to make bird cages or in aquaculture) to fit over the "eggcrate" and glue them together with aquarium sealer. After this has dried two days it can be placed on the downspout pieces. (I offer this last idea on the condition that it not be used to contribute to the spread of goodieds).

Ed. Note- Goodeids are smart enough to tell the difference between their fry and food, so they don't need breeding traps.

#### OBSERVATION IS IT'S OWN REWARD

You know, it can be very frustrating when your fish aren't spawning when you want them to, or when they do, the fry all die, or eat each other, or get eaten, or meet another untimely end. (I am becoming convinced that there is a gremlin hiding in the bottom of my gourami tank, which comes out at night for the sole purpose of devouring gourami and betta fry—a gremlin with an insatiable appetite.) But, despite these frustartions, fish provide us with enormous pleasure, even when the little so—and—sos decide to eat each other instead of making more little so—and—sos. Why?

It can't be just the challenge. Driving home through rush hour may be a challenge, but it just doesn't give one a thrill of satisfaction. Completing a major project on our own gives us a real sense of accomplishment, just as spawning a new species does, but there is something more in a tankful of fish than the potential for accomplishing "breeding success". The fish are fun to watch.

Now, I know that sounds trite, but it's true. Admit it. If you don't realize this fact, you're missing a lot. The behavior of various species presents a fascinating show for us, whether we are into cichlids or killies, catfish or guppies, goldfish or gouramis, freshwater or salt. It is amazing to watch the way a female betta moves around the tank, lithely twisting around plant roots as she searches for food. Or to see a Madtom catfish (NOTURUS insignis) searching for his dinner when he can smell it but can't see it. Or to watch the group dynamics of several young cichlids as they begin to pair off.

I've heard it claimed that the presence of an aquarium in a room tends to result in lower tension and anxiety levels, and I believe it. There are few things more peaceful and relaxing than sitting in front of an aquarium, just fish-watching. My wife and I often sit on the floor in front of our tanks late at night, when all lights in the house are out, except those over the aquaria. We talk about what the fish are doing, and what we would like to do with the tank, and what needs to be done with it (there's always something), but we usually end up talking about just about anything and everything, while sitting there watching the fish.

If your sole purpose in keeping aquaria is to spawn fish, then you are missing this whole aspect. I'm not saying that we shouldn't be trying to spawn fish whenever we can, or encouraging and helping others to spawn successfully—we should do both of these. But observation is its own reward, and the joys of simply watching the fish are easily overlooked.

Besides, it helps to remember the brighter side when the male just mangled the female instead of spawning, and you're having thoughts of PAGE  $_{\rm Q}$ 

Cichlasoma fillet for dinner; the so-and-sos really are beautiful, even when they don't spawn (and tear up your plants). Next time frustration set in, set yourself down in front of some fish, and let them help you unwind. Who knows? By observing, you may even learn what it takes to spawn them.



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
